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2. My message today is to direct our attention to the Very, Very Good News first; then to follow that with the Very, Very Bad News.

THE VERY, VERY GOOD NEWS

 This "good news" was announced by "an angel of the Lord" on that first Christmas many years ago.

But the angel said to them:

"Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

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THE VERY, VERY "GOOD" NEWS

- This "good news" was announced by "an angel of the Lord" on that first Christmas many years ago.
- Please open you Bibles with me to 2 Timothy 1. Our passage for last Sunday and today is verses 9, 10.

2 TIMOTHY 1:9-10

"God . . . has has saved us and called us to a holy life—not because of anything we have done but because of his own purpose and grace. This grace was given us in Christ Jesus before the beginning of time, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior, Christ Jesus, who has destroyed death and has brought life and immortality to light through the gospel."

THE CHARACTER OF SALVATION

- 1. God chose us and predestined us "before the foundation of the world" (Eph. 1:4-5)
- 2. We were saved (vs. 9): from sin's guilt (we're forgiven) & penalty (damnation)
- 3. We are being saved (vs. 9):

 God "called us to a holy life" (progressive sanctification)
- 4. We will be saved (vs. 10)

 "Christ ... brought life and immortality to light" (glorification)

THE **SOURCE** OF SALVATION

- 1. Salvation does not come from us. "not because of anything we have done"
- 2. Salvation comes from God. "but because of his own purpose and grace"

THE **GROUND** OF SALVATION

This "salvation" <u>rests firmly upon</u> the historic work performed by Jesus Christ at his first appearing; namely, his death and resurrection.

- 1. Death is the "wage" sin pays (Rom. 6:23).
- 2. Jesus "destroyed" (or, "abolished") death.
- 3. Christ decisively defeated death (cp. 1 Cor. 15:55).
- 4. *Physical death* is no longer the <u>grim ogre</u> it once was to us (i.e., Christian believers).
- 5. **Spiritual death** has, for Christian believers, given place to that eternal life which is communion with God <u>begun</u> on earth and <u>perfected</u> in heaven.

HEBREWS 2:14-15

"Since the children have flesh and blood, he too shared in their humanity so that by his death he might destroy him who holds the power of death that is, the devil— and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of death."

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"The reason the birth of Jesus is such gloriously wonderful news is that in his birth God offers you and me the only solution to the fundamental brokenness of sin that is the core tragedy of every one of our lives."

THE VERY, VERY "BAD" NEWS

Five words convey our condition as sinners:

 Because of sin we exist in a from-birth state of <u>separation</u>.

- 5. Finally, sin leaves us **hopeless**.
