He giveth more grace when the burdens grow greater He sendeth more strength when the labors increase To added affliction He addeth His mercy To multiplied trials His multiplied peace.

When we have exhausted our store of endurance When our strength has failed ere the day is half done When we reach the end of our hoarded resources Our Father's full giving is only begun.

His love has no limit, His grace has no measure His pow'r has no boundary known unto men For out of His infinite riches in Jesus He giveth, and giveth, and giveth again. This epistle contains two definite prophetic utterances concerning the coming apostasy (3:1-9; 4:3-4). The fact of this apostasy lies in the background of the epistle.

In this closing epistle Paul is given to see what will take place in the history of the Church. He foresaw "grievous wolves" would come (3:1) when there would be a deliberate refusal to hear and accept the truth, but a ready acceptance of teachings to their liking (4:3-4).

The result would be a professing church "having a form of godliness, but denying its power" (3:5).

The Apostle already saw the evidences of that apostasy in the growing number of fa. teachers in the churches (2:16-18; 3:6-7).
