

# ACTS 15:1-2

Some men came down from Judea to Antioch and were teaching the brothers: "Unless you are circumcised, according to the custom taught by Moses, you cannot be saved." This brought Paul and Barnabas into sharp dispute and debate with them. So Paul and Barnabas were appointed, along with some other believers, to go up to Jerusalem to see the apostles and elders about this question."


### ACTS 15:4-5

When they came to Jerusalem, they were welcomed by the church and the apostles and elders, to whom they reported everything God had done through them. Then some of the believers who belonged to the party of the Pharisees stood up & said, "The Gentiles must be circumcised and required to obey the law of Moses."

The apostles of Jesus Christ were unique—unique in their experience of the Jesus of history, unique in their sight of the risen Lord, unique in their commission by Christ's authority and unique in their inspiration by the Holy Spirit. We may not exalt our opinions over theirs or claim that our authority is as great as theirs. For their opinions and authority are Christ's. If we would bow to His authority, we must therefore bow to theirs. As He Himself said, "he who receives you receives Me" (Matt. 10:40; John 13:20).

#### **GALATIANS 2:14**

"When I saw that they were not acting in line with the truth of the gospel, I said to Peter in front of them all, "You are a Jew ( Ιουδαΐος ), yet you live like a Gentile and not like a Jew ( Touodikac). How is it, then, that you force Gentiles to follow Jewish customs ( ἴουδαϊζω )?"

"Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ, who gave himself for our sins to rescue us from the present evil age, according to the will of our God & Father, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."

"I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you by the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel—which is really no gospel at all. Evidently some people are throwing you into confusion and are trying to pervert the gospel of Christ. But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach a gospel other than the one we preached to you, let him be eternally condemned! As we have already said, so now I say again: If anybody is preaching to you a gospel other than what you accepted, let him be eternally condemned!"

"Paul's introduction is direct, intense, and confrontational. The abrupt beginning and the absence of words of commendation reveal the seriousness of the problem confronting the Galatian churches. Paul cuts immediately to the heart of the matter. The unthinkable is happening. Judaizers are attempting to replace the gospel with a different gospel that is no gospel at all. The seriousness of the issue leaves no room for niceties. Paul is shocked that these churches have abandoned (deserted) the God of grace Himself to embrace a gospel that bears no resemblance to the real thing (1:6-7). Anyone, and that includes even angels, who would preach another gospel than that of salvation by faith in the cross of Christ, deserves eternal condemnation (1:8-10)."

"After greeting his readers, in every other Epistle Paul goes on to pray for them or to praise and thank God. Only in the Epistle to the Galatians are there no prayer, no praise, no thanksgiving and no commendation. Instead he addresses himself at once to his theme with a note of extreme urgency. He expresses astonishment at the fickleness and instability of the Galatians. He goes on to complain about the false teachers who were troubling the Galatian churches. And then he utters a most solemn, fearful anathema upon those who dare to change the gospel."



Anybody who rejects the apostolic gospel, no matter who he may be, is himself to be rejected. He may appear as 'an angel from heaven'. In this case we are to prefer apostles to angels. We are not to be dazzled, as many people are, by the person, gifts or office of teachers in the church. They may come to us with great dignity, authority and scholarship. They may be bishops or archbishops, university professors or even the pope himself. But if they bring a gospel other than the gospel preached by the apostles and recorded in the New Testament, they are to be rejected. We judge them by the gospel; we do not judge the gospel by them. As Dr. Alan Cole expresses it, "The outward person of the messenger does not validate his message; rather, the nature of the message validates the messenger."

"Of course we live in an age in which it is considered very narrow-minded and intolerant to have any clear and strong opinions of one's own, let alone to disagree sharply with anybody else. As for actually desiring false teachers to fall under the curse of God and be treated as such by the church, the very idea is to many inconceivable. But I venture to say that if we cared more for the glory of Christ and for the good of the souls of men, we too would not be able to bear the corruption of the gospel of grace."

Christianity can survive without the Gospel. Let me clarify. There is a form of Christianity that developed in medieval times that has survived to this day without the gospel. It is, of course, a powerless Christianity that cannot give people the assurance of salvation, nor does it lead to lives of holiness — but it is still called Christianity. Yes, whether Catholic or Protestant, every generation, including ours, has to fight for the purity of the gospel. It's our nature to reject the gospel's verdict on us and resist the profound simplicity of its transforming message of grace. The gospel must always be defended, and sometimes it must be rescued.
