


The Emancipation Proclamation of Christianity

"We are prone to look at the cross (and crucifixion) in a sentimental way. We wear crosses on our lapels or on chains around our necks. But to the first-century citizen, the cross was not a beautiful piece of jewelry; it was the lowest form of death and the ultimate in humiliation. The proper Roman citizen would never mention the cross in polite conversation. It stood for rejection and shame. When Paul trusted Christ, he identified himself with the cross and took the consequences. To the Jew the cross was a stumbling block, and to the Gentile it was foolishness (1 Cor. 1:18-31). The legalists, emphasizing circumcision rather than crucifixion, won many converts. Theirs was a popular religion because it avoided the shame of the cross."

"Here Paul teaches three great truths about the church. The church is the Israel of God. 'All who walk by this rule' and 'the Israel of God' are not two groups, but one. The connecting particle kai should be translated 'even', not 'and', or be omitted (as in RSV). The Christian church enjoys a direct continuity with God's people in the Old Testament. Those who are in Christ today are 'the true circumcision' (Phil. 3:3), 'Abraham's offspring' (Gal. 3:29) and 'the Israel of God'."



The Reconciliation/Discipline Dynamic as Outlined by Jesus in Matthew 18:15-20



"If the sowing is the doing of good works in the community, what is the harvest? Paul does not tell us; he leaves us to guess. But the patient doing of good in the church or community always produces good results. It may bring comfort, relief or assistance to people in need. It may lead a sinner to repentance and so to salvation; Jesus Himself spoke of this work as sowing & reaping (Mt. 9:37; Jn. 4:35–38). It may help to arrest the moral deterioration of society (this is the func-tion of 'the salt of the earth') and even to make it a sweeter and more wholesome place to live in. It may increase men's respect for what is beautiful, good and true, especially in days when standards are slipping fast. And it will bring good to the doer as well—not indeed salvation (for this is a free gift of God), but some reward in heaven for faithful service, which will probably take the form of yet more responsible service."
