OVERVIEW:

Most Christians quickly identify Christ's death with deliverance from the penalty and punishment of sin. However, fewer Christians are quick to identify Christ's death with deliverance from the power of or slavery to sin. This lesson stresses that God intends for Christians to live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present age, and that Christ's death and future coming provides the basis for such living & the incentive to & the enablement for such living.

THE BASIS FOR GODLINESS (2:11-14)

The doctrine on which Paul bases his ethical appeal (2:1-10) is that of the two comings of Christ, which he calls appearing's (or, **epiphanies**):

- (1) Verse 11: "the grace of God ... <u>has appeared</u>" (verb: **epephane**), and
- (2) Verse 13: "we wait for ... the appearing of" (noun: epiphaneian).

The noun means the visible appearance of something or someone previously (up until now) invisible; a coming into view of what has been previously concealed.

Luke gives us a good example of its meaning in Acts. It's the only occasion in the NT when "epiphaneia" has a secular meaning and doesn't refer to Christ. See Acts 27:20.

Apart from this one lit. use of **epiphaneia**, the word occurs in the NT four times of Christ's first coming and six times of his second coming. Here, in Titus, the word is used of both Christ's comings (2:11, 13).
