**OVERVIEW:** 

Most Christians quickly identify Christ's death with deliverance from the penalty and punishment of sin. However, fewer Christians are quick to identify Christ's death with deliverance from the power of or slavery to sin. This lesson stresses that God intends for Christians to live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present age, and that Christ's death provides both the basis for such living, the enablement for such living, & the incentive to such living.

#### From Forgiven to Faithfulness



Philemon, Titus, and 2 Timothy focus upon *forgiveness, righteousness & faithfulness.* We enter upon the Christian life as God grants us <u>forgiveness</u> in Jesus Christ. As we grow in Christ, our lives become increasingly characterized by <u>righteousness</u>. And God expects <u>faithfulness</u> from us, His servants, until He takes us home to heaven.
