Second Peter is the last testament of Simon Peter (1:12-15). Peter is conscious that his martyrdom is rapidly approaching. Second Peter is reminiscent of Paul's second letter to Timothy. The church is facing assault from a hostile world, but it is also being infiltrated by false teachers (2:1-22). The church is at risk of being infected by the growing indifference to Christ's return and the judgment to follow (3:1-16). Second Peter might well have been written today at the dawning of a third millennium. Like a mirror, it reflects the pagan culture of our times and the prevailing condition of the church. 2nd Peter is greatly needed, yet it is little known and is lightly regarded in our time.







Dr. Kenneth Hanna, From the Gospels to Glory, (2015)

The author claims to be Peter and identifies himself as an apostle. The writer calls himself Simon Peter (1991). He claims to be a personal eyewitness of the transfiguration of Christ (1:16-18) and recalls the Lord's prediction of His death (1:14; John 21:18-19). He uses the first person singular pronoun "I" in a highly personal passage. The author places himself on a par with the apostle Paul, with whom the author was a contemporary (3:15). He also claims to have written a previous letter (3:1).







What are Critical Scholars?






Historical (or, Literary) criticism is a branch of literary analysis that investigates the origins of ancient texts in order to understand "the world behind the text."

HIGHER CRITICISM or Historical Criticism

LOWER CRITICISM or Textual Criticism

The discipline concerned with the recovery of original texts especially of Scripture through the collation of extant manuscripts.

NIV Study Bible - Comment on Heb. 1:1-2

in the past (vs. 1) = prior to Christ's coming, in contrast to in these last days (vs. 2) = the Messianic era inaugurated by the incarnation.

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What are the "last days"?





NIV Study Bible - Comment on 1 John 2:18

this is the last hour - With other NT writers, John viewed the whole period beginning with Christ's first coming as the last days. They understood this to be the "last" of the days because neither former prophecy nor new revelation concerning the history of salvation indicated the coming of another era before the return of Christ. The word "last" in "last days", "last times", "last hour" also expresses a sense of urgency and imminence. The Christian is to be alert, waiting for the return of Christ (Matt. 25:1-13).

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"Peter, an apostle of Jesus Christ, to God's elect, strangers in the world, scattered throughout Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia and Bithynia, who have been chosen according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through the sanctifying work of the Spirit, for obedience to Jesus Christ and sprinkling by his blood: Grace and peace be yours in abundance."


