Second Peter is the last testament of Simon Peter (1:12-15). Peter *is conscious* that his martyrdom is rapidly approaching. Second Peter *is reminiscent* of Paul's second letter to Timothy. The church is *facing assault* from a hostile world, but it is also being infiltrated by false teachers (2:1-22). The church is at risk of being infected by the growing indifference to Christ's return and the judgment to follow (3:1-16). Second Peter might well have been written today at the dawning of a third millennium. Like a mirror, it reflects the pagan culture of our times and the prevailing condition of the church. 2<sup>nd</sup> Peter is greatly needed, yet it is *little known* and is *lightly regarded* in our time.





#### What are Critical Scholars?



Historical (or, Literary) criticism is a branch of literary analysis that investigates the origins of ancient texts in order to understand "the world behind the text."

# HIGHER CRITICISM or Historical Criticism LOWER CRITICISM or Textual Criticism

The discipline concerned with *the recovery of original texts* especially of Scripture *through the collation of extant manuscripts*.

#### Two major views of 2 Peter 1:20



Two major views of 2 Peter 1:20 are: (1) No prophecy is to be privately or independently interpreted (cf. false teachers in 3:16). The Holy Spirit, Scripture itself, & the church should be included in the interpretive process. (2) No prophecy originated through the prophet's own interpretation. The preceding and following contexts indicate that this view is probably to be preferred. In vss. 16-19 the subject discussed is the origin of the apostolic message. Did it come from human imaginings, or was it from God? In vs. 20 again the subject is origin. No prophecy of Scripture arose from a merely human interpretation of things. This understanding of vs. 20 is further supported by the explanatory "For" with which vs. 21 begins. Verse 21 explains verse 20 by restating its content and then affirming God as the origin of prophecy.





#### "carried along by the Holy Spirit"




In the production of Scripture God and man were active participants. God was the source of the content of Scripture, so that what it says is what God has said. But the human author also actively spoke; he was more than a recorder. Yet what he said came from God. Although actively speaking, he <u>was carried along</u> by the Holy Spirit.


Acts 27:15 – "The ship was caught by the storm & could not head into the wind, so we gave way to it and <u>were</u> <u>driven along</u>."








### **BIBLE TRANSLATION CHART**


