Jesus' method of judging sin can be contrasted with that of His foes. They brought the woman in as a captive; He questioned her as a free person. They regarded her as an accessory to their convenience; He respected her as a human being. They saw only the blackness of her past —"the very act"; He thought in terms of her future —"sin no more." They were eager to stone her; He was ready to save her.
