## Faithfulness in Ministry Lesson 12 • 2 Timothy 4:1-8

#### **OVERVIEW:**

This text makes two major points. The first, which is the **bases** of faithful ministry, provides reasons to faithfully minister for Christ. The second, the **behaviors** of faithfulness in ministry, lists a number of specific activities that exemplify faithful ministry.



### Faithfulness and Apostasy Lesson 11 • 2 Timothy 3

"Who is intended by this expression is not explained. It may be a general term for every Christian, since the words themselves mean no more than 'the man who belongs to God' (NEB). On the other hand, it was an Old Testament title of respect applied to some of God's spokesmen like Moses (Dt. 33:1), David (2 Ch. 8:14), and Elijah (1 Kgs. 17:18), and Paul specifically addressed Timothy by this phrase in his first letter (6:11). It may therefore refer here to men called to positions of responsibility in the church, and especially to ministers whose task it is, under the authority of Scripture, to teach and refute, to reform and discipline. At all events, it is only by a diligent study of Scripture that the man of God may become 'complete, equipped for every good work'." - John R. W. Stott
